


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

#### INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The City of Mesquite maintains a pooled investment portfolio that utilizes specific investment strategy considerations designed to address the unique characteristics of the fund groups represented in the portfolio. In order to minimize risk of loss due to interest rate fluctuations, investment maturities will not exceed the anticipated cash flow requirements of the funds. The composite portfolio will have a dollar weighted average maturity of 365 days or less. This dollar weighted average maturity will be calculated using the stated final maturity dates of each security. Investment guidelines by fund-type are as follows:

- Investment strategies for operating funds have as their primary objective to assure
  that anticipated cash flows are matched with adequate investment liquidity. The
  secondary objective is to create a portfolio structure that will experience minimal
  volatility during economic cycles. This may be accomplished by purchasing high
  quality, short- to medium-term securities that will complement each other in a
  laddered structure.
- Investment strategies for debt service funds shall have as the primary objective the
  assurance of investment liquidity adequate to cover the debt service obligations on
  the required payment date. Securities purchased shall not have a stated final
  maturity date which exceeds the debt service payment date, or funds shall be
  maintained in an investment pool or money market mutual fund to be available for
  debt service payments.

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Investment strategies for bond funds and for debt service reserve funds shall have
as the primary objective the ability to generate a dependable revenue source to the
appropriate fund from securities with a low degree of volatility. Except as may be
required by the bond ordinance specific to an individual issue, securities should be
of high quality, with short to medium term maturities.

# CITY OF MESQUITE INVESTMENT POLICY

#### I. POLICY

It is the policy of the City of Mesquite (City) that after allowing for the anticipated cash flow requirements of the City and giving due consideration to the safety and risk of investment, all available funds shall be invested in conformance with these legal and administrative guidelines and to the maximum extent possible, at the highest rates obtainable at the time of investment.

Effective cash management is recognized as essential to good fiscal management. Investment interest is a viable and material source of revenue to City funds. The City's investment portfolio shall be designed and managed in a manner designed to maximize this revenue source, to be responsive to public trust, and to be in compliance with legal requirements and limitations.

Investments shall be made with the primary objectives of:

· Safety and preservation of principal

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- · Maintenance of sufficient liquidity to meet operating needs
- · Maximization of yield on the portfolio
- · Public trust from prudent investment activities


#### H. PURPOSE

The purpose of this investment policy is to comply with Chapter 2256 of Title 10 of the Local Government Code("Public Funds Investment Act") which requires each city to adopt a written investment policy regarding the investment of its funds and funds under its control. The Investment Policy addresses the methods, procedures and practices which must be exercised to ensure effective and judicious fiscal management of the City of Mesquite funds.

#### III. SCOPE

This Investment Policy shall govern the investment of all financial assets of the City of Mesquite. These funds are accounted for in the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) and include:

- General Fund
- · Special Revenue Funds



- Diversifying the investment portfolio so that potential losses on individual securities will be minimized.
- n Interest Rate Risk the City will minimize the risk that the market value of securities in the portfolio will fall due to changes in general interest rates, by:
  - Structuring the investment portfolio so that securities mature to meet cash requirements for ongoing operations, thereby avoiding the need to sell securities on the open market prior to maturity
  - Investing operating funds primarily in shorter-term securities, money market mutual funds, or similar investment pools

#### Liquidity

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The investment portfolio shall remain sufficiently liquid to meet all operating requirements that may be reasonably anticipated. This is accomplished by structuring the portfolio so that securities mature concurrent with cash needs to meet anticipated demands. Because all possible cash demands cannot be anticipated, the portfolio should consist largely of securities with active secondary or resale markets. A portion of the portfolio will also be placed in money market mutual funds or local government investment pools which offer same day liquidity for short-term funds.

#### Yield

The investment portfolio shall be designed with the objective of attaining a market rate of return throughout budgetary and economic cycles, taking into account the investment risk constraints and liquidity needs. Return on investment is of secondary importance compared to the safety and liquidity objectives described above. The core of investments are limited to relatively tow risk securities in anticipation of earning a fair return relative to the risk being assumed.

#### Public Trust

All participants ir. the City's investment process shall seek to act responsibly as custodians of the public trust. Investment officials shall avoid any transaction which might impair public confidence in the City's ability to govern effectively.

#### V. RESPONSIBILITY AND CONTROL

#### Delegation of Authority

Article IV, Section 26 of the Mesquite City Charter designates that the City Finance Director shall serve as City Treasurer and perform any duties of City Treasurer as required by the general laws of the State of Texas. The Director of Finance shall delegate the responsibility for investment decisions and activities to an Investment Officer.

Through the adoption of this policy, the positions of Cash and Debt Coordinator and Accounting Manager shall be designated as investment officers who are responsible for the investment of the City's funds. No person may engage in an investment transaction or the management of funds except as provided under the terms of this Investment Policy as approved by the City Council. The investment authority granted to the investing officers is effective until rescinded by the governing body.

#### Training Requirement

The Director of Finance and investment officers shall attend an investment training session no less often than once every two fiscal years commencing September 1, 1997 and shall receive not less than 10 hours of instruction relating to investment responsibilities. The investment training session shall be provided by an independent source approved by the City Council. For purposes of this policy, an "independent source" from which investment training shall be obtained shall include a professional organization, an institute of higher learning or any other sponsor other than a business organization with whom the City of Mesquite may engage in an investment transaction.

#### Internal Controls

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Maria de la companio Nacional de la companio de la compa The Director of Finance is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure designed to ensure that the assets of the entity are protected from loss, theft, or misuse. The internal control structure shall be designed to provide reasonable assurance that these objectives are met. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that (1) the cost of a control should not exceed the benefits likely to be derived; and (2) the valuation of costs and benefits requires estimates and judgments by management.

Accordingly, the Director of Finance shall establish a process for annual independent review by an external auditor to assure compliance with policies and procedures. The internal controls shall address the following points.

- · Control of collusion.
- · Separation of transactions authority from accounting and record keeping.
- Custodial safekeeping.
- · Avoidance of physical delivery securities.
- · Clear delegation of authority to subordinate staff members.
- Written confirmation for telephone (voice) transactions for investments and wire transfers
- Development of a wire transfer agreement with the depository bank or third party custodian.

#### **Prudence**

The standard of prudence to be applied by the investment officer shall be the "prudent investor" rule which states: "Investments shall be made with judgment and care, under

circumstances then prevailing, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of their capital as well as the probable income to be derived." In determining whether an investment officer has exercised prudence with respect to an investment decision, the determination shall be made taking into consideration:

- The investment of all funds, or funds under the City's control, over which the
  officer had responsibility rather than a consideration as to the prudence of a
  single investment.
- Whether the investment decision was consistent with the written investment policy of the City.

#### Indemnification

The investment officer, acting in accordance with written procedures and exercising due diligence, shall not be held personally responsible for a specific security's credit risk or market price changes, provided that these deviations are reported immediately and the appropriate action is taken to control adverse developments.

## **Ethics and Conflicts of Interest**

Officers and employees involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with the proper execution and management of the investment program, or that could impair their ability to make impartial decisions. Employees and investment officials shall disclose any material interests in financial institutions with which they conduct business. They shall further disclose any personal financial/investment positions that could be related to the performance of the investment portfolio. Employees and officers shall refrain from undertaking personal investment transactions with the same individual with whom business is conducted on behalf of the City.

An investment officer of the City who has a personal business relationship with an organization seeking to sell an investment to the City shall file a statement disclosing that personal business interest. An investment officer who is related within the second degree by affinity or consanguinity to an individual seeking to sell an investment to the City shall file a statement disclosing that relationship. A statement required under this subsection must be filed with the Texas Ethics Commission and the governing body of the entity.

## VI. SUITABLE AND AUTHORIZED INVESTMENTS

#### Portfolio Management

The City currently has a "buy and hold" portfolio strategy. Maturity dates are matched with cash flow requirements and investments are purchased with the intent to be held until maturity. However, securities may be sold before they mature if market conditions present an opportunity for the City to benefit from the trade. Securities may be sold for the following reasons:

- A security with declining credit may be sold early to minimize loss of principal.
- A security swap would improve the quality, yield, or target duration in the portfolio.
- Liquidity needs of the portfolio require that the security be sold.

#### Investments

Assets of the City of Mesquite may be invested in the following instruments; provided, however, that at no time shall assets of the City be invested in any instrument or security not authorized for investment under the Act, as the Act may from time to time be amended.

#### J. Authorized

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- Obligations of the United States of America, its agencies and instrumentalities.
- 2. Certificates of Deposit of state and national banks domiciled in Texas, a savings and loan association domiciled in this state, or a state or federal credit union domiciled in this state that is guaranteed or insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance or its successor or secured by obligations in a manner and amount provided by law for deposits of the investing entity.
- 3. Fully collateralized direct repurchase agreements with a defined termination date secured by obligations of the United States or its agencies and instrumentalities pledged to the City, held in the City's name, and deposited at the time the investment is made with the City or with a third party selected and approved by the City. Repurchase agreements must be purchased through a primary government securi ies dealer, as defined by the Federal Reserve, or a bank domicited in Texas. A Master Repurchase Agreement must be signed by the bank/dealer prior to investment in a repurchase agreement. All repurchase agreement transactions will be on a delivery vs. payment basis. Securities received for repurchase agreements must have a market value greater than or equal to 102 percent at the time funds are disbursed.

- Money Market Mutual funds that are 1) registered and regulated by the SEC,
   2)have a dollar weighted average stated maturity of 90 days or less, and
   3)maintain a net asset value of \$1 for each share.
- 5. Government investment pools which 1) meet the requirements of Chapter 2256.016 of the Public Funds Investment Act, 2) are rated no lower than AAA or an equivalent rating by at least one nationally recognized rating service and 3) are authorized by resolution or ordinance by City Council.

#### II. Not Authorized

Under no circumstances shall investments be made in interest-only or principal-only strips of obligations with underlying mortgage-backed security collateral, or in collateralized mortgage obligations with an inverse floating interest rate or a maturity date of over 10 years. Neither shall investments be made in obligations that are secured by these prohibited investments.

#### VII. INVESTMENT PARAMETERS

#### Maximum Maturities

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The longer the maturity of investments, the greater their price volatility. Therefore, it is the City's policy to concentrate its investment portfolio in shorter-term securities in order to limit principal risk caused by changes in interest rates.

The City attempts to match its investments with anticipated cash flow requirements. Unless matched to a specific cash flow, the City will not directly invest in securities maturity more than three (3) years from the date of purchase; however, the above described obligations, certificates, or agreements may be collateralized using longer dated investments.

Because no secondary market exists for repurchase agreements, the maximum maturity shall be 120 days.

The composite portfolio will have a weighted average maturity of one (1) year or less. This dollar weighted average maturity will be calculated using the stated final maturity dates of each security.

## Diversification

The City of Mesquite recognizes that investment risks can result from issuer defaults, market price changes or various technical complications leading to temporary illiquidity. Risk is controlled through portfolio diversification which shall be achieved by the following general guidelines:

- Limiting investments to avoid overconcentration in securities from a specific issuer or business sector (excluding U.S. Treasury securities).
- · Limiting investment in securities that have higher credit risks,
- · Investing in securities with varying maturities, and
- Continuously investing a portion of the portfolio in readily available funds such as local government investment pools (LGIPs), money market funds or overnight repurchase agreements to ensure that appropriate liquidity is maintained in order to meet ongoing obligations.

The following maximum limits, by instrument, are established for the City's total portfolio:

#### VIII. SELECTION OF BANKS AND DEALERS

#### Depository

TOTAL MARKET

At least every five years a Depository shall be selected through the City's banking services procurement process, which shall include a formal request for proposal (RFP). The selection of a depository will be determined by competitive bid and evaluation of bids will be based on the following selection criteria:

- The ability to qualify as a depository for public funds in accordance with state and local laws.
- The ability to provide requested information or financial statements for the periods specified.
- The ability to meet all requirements in the banking RFP.
- Complete response to all required items on the bid form
- Lowest net banking service cost, consistent with the ability to provide an
  appropriate level of service.
- · The credit worthiness and financial stability of the bank.

#### Authorized Brokers/Dealers

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The City shall select dealers reporting to the Market Reports Division of the Federal Reserve Board of New York, also known as "Primary Government Security Dealers", or regional dealers that qualify under Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) Rule 15C3-1 (uniform net capital rule.)

All financial institutions and broker/dealers who desire to become qualified bidders for investment transactions must supply the following as appropriate:

- · audited financial statements
- · completed broker/dealer questionnaire
- certification of having read and understood the City's investment policy and agreeing to comply with the policy

The governing body must adopt and annually review a list of qualified broker/dealers authorized to engage in investment transactions with the City.

#### Competitive Bids

Competitive quotes must be taken from at least three qualifying institutions for any investment transaction. Investment transactions may be done orally, but followed by electronic or written confirmation. Funds will be authorized to be released after notification that the purchased security has been received. Written confirmation shall be received from the financial institution or broker/dealer. All investments purchased will be held in safekeeping at a third party custodial institution with a safekeeping receipt being sent to the City.

## Delivery vs. Payment

Securities shall be purchased using the delivery vs. payment method with the exception of investment pools and mutual funds. Funds shall not be wired or paid until verification has been made that the correct security was received by the Trustee. The security shall be held in the name of the City or held on behalf of the City. The Trustee's records shall assure the notation of the City's ownership of or explicit claim on the securities. The original copy of all safekeeping receipts shall be delivered to the City.

### IX. SAFEKEEPING OF SECURITIES

## Safekeeping Agreement

The City shall contract with a bank or banks for the safekeeping of securities either owned by the City as part of its investment pertfolio or held as collateral to secure demand or time deposits.

## Safckeeping

All securities owned by the City shall be held by its safekeeping agent, except the collateral for certificates of deposits in banks. The collateral for certificates of deposit in banks will be registered in the City's name in the bank's trust department or, alternatively, in a Federal Reserve Bank account in the City's name, or a third-party bank in the City's name, at the City's discretion. Original safekeeping receipts shall be obtained.

#### **Collateralization**

Consistent with the requirements of the Public Funds Collateral Act, it is the policy of the City to require full collateralization of all City investments and funds on deposit with a depository bank, other than investments which are obligations of the U.S. government and its agencies and instrumentalities. In order to anticipate market changes and provide a level of security for all funds, the collateralization level will be 102% of market value of principal and accrued interest on the deposits or investments less an amount insured by the FDIC or FSLIC. At its discretion, the City may require a higher level of collateralization for certain investment securities. Securities pledged as collateral shall be held by an independent third party with whom the City has a current custodial agreement. The Director of Finance is responsible for entering into collateralization agreements with third party custodians in compliance with this Policy. The agreements are to specify the acceptable investment securities for collateral, including provisions relating to possession of the collateral, the substitution or release of investment securities, ownership of securities, and the method of valuation of securities. A clearly marked evidence of ownership (safekeeping receipt) must be supplied to the City and retained. Collateral shall be reviewed at least weekly to assure that the market value of the pledged securities is adequate.

#### Collateral Defined

The City of Mesquite shall accept only the following securities as collateral:

- FDIC and FSLIC insurance coverage.
- A bond, certificate of indebtedness, or Treasury Note of the United States, or other
  evidence of indebtedness of the United States that is guaranteed as to principal and
  interest by the United States.
- Obligations, the principal and interest on which, are unconditionally guaranteed or insured by the State of Texas.
- A bond of the State of Texas or of a county, city or other political subdivision of the State of Texas having been rated as investment grade (investment rating no less than

"A" or its equivalent) by a nationally recognized rating agency with a remaining maturity of ten (10) years or less.

## Subject to Audit

All collateral shall be subject to inspection and audit by the Director of Finance or the City's independent auditors.

#### X. PERFORMANCE

#### Performance Standards

The City's investment portfolio will be managed in accordance with the parameters specified within this policy. The portfolio shall be designed with the objective of obtaining a rate of return through budgetary and economic cycles, commensurate with the investment risk constraints and the cash flow requirements of the City.

#### Performance Benchmark


It is the policy of the City to purchase investments with maturity dates coinciding with cash flow needs. Through this strategy, the City attempts to purchase the highest yielding allowable investments available on the market at that time. Market value will be calculated on a quarterly basis on all securities owned and compared to current book value of those securities to determine portfolio performance during that period of time. The City's portfolio shall be designed with the objective of regularly meeting or exceeding the average rate of return on U.S. Treasury Bills at a maturity level comparable to the City's weighted average maturity in days.

#### XI. REPORTING

#### Methods

The Investment Officer shall prepare an investment report on a quarterly basis that summarizes investment strategies employed in the most recent quarter and describes the portfolio in terms of investment securities, maturities, and shall explain the total investment return for the quarter.

The quarterly investment report shall include a summary statement of investment activity prepared in compliance with generally accepted accounting principals. This summary will be prepared in a manner which will allow the City to ascertain whether investment activities during the reporting period have conformed to the Investment Policy. The report will be provided to the City Manager and City Council. The report will include the following:



- Unrealized gains or losses resulting from appreciation or depreciation by listing the beginning and ending book and market value of securities for the period.
- Additions and changes to the market value during the period.
- Average weighted yield to maturity of portfolio as compared to applicable benchmark.
- · Listing of investments by maturity date.
- · Fully accrued interest for the reporting period
- The percentage of the total portfolio which each type of investment represents.
- Statement of compliance of the City's investment portfolio with state law and the investment strategy and policy approved by the City Council.

A formal annual review of the quarterly reports will be performed by an independent auditor with the results reported to the governing body.

#### Marking to Market

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Market value of all securities in the portfolio will be determined on a quarterly basis. These values will be obtained from a reputable and independent source and disclosed to the governing body quarterly in a written report.

#### XII. INVESTMENT POLICY ADOPTION

The City of Mesquite investment policy shall be adopted by resolution of the City Council. It is the City's intent to comply with state laws and regulations. The City's investments policies shall be subject to revisions to stay current with changing laws, regulations, and needs of the City. The policy shall be reviewed annually by the City Council and any changes or modifications must be approved by the City Council.

#### GLOSSARY OF COMMON TREASURY TERMINOLOGY

Accrued Interest: The accumulated interest due on a bond as of the last interest payment made by the issuer.

Agency: A debt security issued by a federal or federally sponsored agency. Federal agencies are backed by the full faith and credit of the U.S. Government. Federally sponsored agencies (FSAs) are backed by each particular agency with a market perception that there is an implicit government guarantee. An example of federal agency is the Government National Mortgage Association (GNMA). An example of a FSA is the Federal National Mortgage Association (FNMA).

Amortization: The systematic reduction of the amount owed on a debt issue through periodic payments of principal.

Asked: The price at which securities are offered.

Average Life: The average length of time that an issue of serial bonds and/or term bonds with a mandatory sinking fund feature is expected to be outstanding.

Basis Point: A unit of measurement used in the valuation of fixed-income securities equal to 1/100 of a percent of yield. E.g., "1/4" of 1 percent is equal to 25 basis points.

Bid: The indicated price at which a buyer is willing to purchase a security or commodity.

Book Value: The value at which a security is carried on the inventory lists or other financial records of an investor. The book value may differ significantly from the security's current value in the market.

Broker: A broker brings buyers and sellers together for a commission paid by the initiator of the transaction or by both sides; he does not position. In the money market, brokers are active in markets in which banks buy and sell money and in interdealer markets.

Callable Bond: A bond issue in which all or part of its outstanding principal amount may be redeemed before maturity by the issuer under specified conditions.

Call Price: The price at which an issuer may redeem a bond prior to maturity. The price is usually at a slight premium to the bond's original issue price to compensate the holder for loss of income and ownership.

Call Risk: The risk to a bondholder that a bond may be redeemed prior to maturity.

Cash Sale/Purchase: A transaction which calls for delivery and payment of securities on the same day that the transaction is initiated. Certificate of Deposit(CD): A time deposit with a specific maturity evidenced by a certificate. Large-denomination CD's are typically negotiable. Collateralization: Process by which a borrower pledges securities, property, or other deposits for the purpose of securing the repayment of a loan and/or security. Commercial Paper: An unsecured short-term promissory note issued by corporations, with maturities ranging from 2 to 270 days. Maybert . Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR): The official annual report for the City of Mesquite. It includes combined statements and basic financial statements for each individual fund and account group prepared in conformity with GAAP. It also includes supporting schedules necessary to demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal and contractual provision, extensive introductory material, and a detailed statistical section. Convexity: A measure of a bond's price sensitivity to changing interest rates. A high Maritim Comment convexity indicates greater sensitivity of a bond's price to interest rate changes. المتراج والمسرونية والمراكة Coupon Rate: The annual rate of interest received by an investor from the issuer of certain types of fixed-income securities. Also known as the "interest rate." Credit Quality: The measurement of the financial strength of a bond issuer. This measurement helps an investor to understand an issuer's ability to make timely interest payments and repay the loan principal upon maturity. Generally, the higher the credit quality of a bond issuer, the lower the interest rate paid by the issuer because the risk of AN COMPANY default is lower. Credit quality ratings are provided by nationally recognized rating agencies. Credit Risk: The risk to an investor that an issuer will default in the payment of interest and/or principal on a security. Current Yield(Current Return): A yield calculation determined by dividing the annual interest received on a security by the current market price of that security. Dealer: A dealer, as opposed to a broker, acts as a principal in all transactions, buying and selling for his own account. Debenture: A bond secured only by the general credit of the issuer. Delivery versus Payment: There are two methods of delivery of securities: delivery versus payment and delivery versus receipt(also called free). Delivery versus payment is delivery of securities with an exchange of money for the securities. Delivery versus receipt is the delivery of securities with an exchange of a signed receipt for the securities.

Derivative Security: Financial instrument created from, or whose value depends upon, one or more underlying assets or indexes of asset values.

Discount: The amount by which the par value of a security exceeds the price paid for the security.

Discount Securities: Non-interest bearing money market instruments that are issued at a discount and redeemed at maturity for full face value, e.g., U.S. Treasury Bills.

Diversification: A process of investing assets among a range of security types by sector, maturity, and quality rating.

Duration: A measure of the timing of the cash flows, such as the interest payments and the principal repayment, to be received from a given fixed-income security. This calculation is based on three variables: term to maturity, coupon rate, and yield to maturity. The duration of a security is a useful indicator of its price volatility for given changes in interest rates.

Fair Value: The amount at which an investment could be exchanged in a current transaction between willing parties, other than in a forced or liquidation sale.

Federal Funds (Fed Funds): Funds placed in Federal Reserve banks by depository institutions in excess of current reserve requirements. These depository institutions may lend fed funds to each other overnight or on a longer basis. They may also transfer funds among each other on a same-day basis through the Federal Reserve banking system. Fed funds are considered to be immediately available funds.

Federal Funds Rate: Interest rate charged by one institution lending federal funds to the other.

Federal Credit Agencies: Agencies of the Federal government set up to supply credit to various classes of institutions and individuals, e.g. S&L's, small business firms, students, farmers, farm cooperatives, and exporters.

Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation(FDIC): A federal agency that insures bank deposits, currently up to \$100,000 per deposit.

Federal Home Loan Banks (FHLB): The institutions that regulate and lend to savings and loan associations. The Federal Home Loan Banks play a role analogous to that played by the Federal Reserve Banks vis-a-vis member commercial banks.

Federal National Mortgage Association(FNMA): FNMA, like GNMA, was chartered under the Federal National Mongage Association Act in 1938. FNMA is a federal corporation working under the auspices of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, H.U.D. It is the largest single provider of residential mortgage funds in the United States. Fannie Mae, as the corporation is called, is a private stockholder-owned corporation. The corporation's purchases include a variety of adjustable mortgages and second loans in addition to fixed-rate mortgages. FNMA's securities are also highly liquid and are widely accepted. FNMA assumes and guarantees that all security holders will receive timely payment of principal and interest.

Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC): Consists of seven members of the Federal Reserve Board and five of the twelve Federal Reserve Bank Presidents. The President of the New York Federal Reserve Bank is a permanent member while the other Presidents serve on a rotating basis. The Committee periodically meets to set Federal Reserve guidelines regarding purchases and sales of Government Securities in the open-market as a means of influencing the volume of bank credit and money.

Federal Reserve System: The central bank of the United States created by Congress and consisting of a seven member Board of Governors in Washington, D.C., 12 regional banks and about 5,700 commercial banks that are members of the system.

Government National Mortgage Association (GNMA or Ginnie Mae): Securities guaranteed by GNMA and issued by mortgage bankers, commercial banks, savings and loan associations, and other institutions. Security holder is protected by full faith and credit of the U.S. Government. Ginnie Mae securities are backed by FHA, VA or FMHM mortgages. The term pass through is often used to describe Ginnie Maes.

Government Securities: An obligation of the U.S. government, backed by the full faith and credit of the government. These securities are regarded as the highest quality of investment securities available in the U.S. securities market. See "Treasury Bills, Notes, and Bonds."

Interest Rate: See "Coupon Rate."

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Interest Rate Risk: The risk associated with declines or rises in interest rates which cause an investment in a fixed-income security to increase or decrease in value.

Internal Controls: An internal control structure designed to ensure that the assets of the entity are protected from loss, theft, or misuse. The internal control structure is designed to provide reasonable assurance that these objectives are met. The concept of reasonable assurance recognized that 1)the cost of a control should not exceed the benefits likely to be derived and 2) the valuation of costs and benefits requires estimates and judgments by management. Internal controls should address the following points:

Federal National Mortgage Association (FNMA): FNMA, like GNMA, was chartered under the Federal National Mortgage Association Act in 1938. Government National Mortgage Association(GNMA or Ginnic Mae): Securities guaranteed by GNMA and issued by mortgage bankers, commercial banks, savings and loan associations, and other institutions. Security holder is protected by full faith and credit of the U.S. Government. Ginnic Mae securities are backed by FHA, VA or FMHM mortgages. The term pass through is often used to describe Ginnic Maes.

Government Securities: An obligation of the U.S. government, backed by the full faith and credit of the government. These securities are regarded as the highest quality of investment securities available in the U.S. securities market. See "Treasury Bills, Notes, and Bonds."

Interest Rate: See "Coupon Rate."

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- Control of collusion Collusion is a situation where two or more employees are working in conjunction to defraud their employer.
- Separation of transaction authority from accounting and record keeping

   By separating the person who authorizes or performs the transaction from
   the people who record or otherwise account for the transaction, a separation of
   duties is achieved.
- Custodial safekeeping Securities purchased from any bank or dealer including appropriate collateral (as defined by state law) shall be placed with an independent third party for custodial safekeeping.

Inverted Yield Curve: A chart formation that illustrates long-term securities having lower yields than short-term securities. This configuration usually occurs during periods of high inflation coupled with low levels of confidence in the economy and a restrictive monetary policy.

Investment Policy: A concise and clear statement of the objectives and parameters formulated by an investor or investment manager for a portfolio of investment securities.

Investment-grade Obligations: An investment instrument suitable for purchase by institutional investors under the prudent person rule. Investment-grade is restricted to those obligations rated BBB or higher by a rating agency.

Liquidity: A liquid asset is one that can be converted easily and rapidly into cash without a substantial loss of value. In the money market, a security is said to be liquid if the spread between bid and asked prices is narrow and reasonable size can be done at those quotes.

Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP): An investment by local governments in which their money is pooled as a method for managing local funds.

Mark-to-market: The process whereby the book value or collateral value of a security is adjusted to reflect its current market value.

Market Risk: The risk that the value of a security will rise or decline as a result of changes in market conditions.

Market Value: Current market price of a security.

Master Repurchase Agreement: To protect investors, many public investors will request that repurchase agreements be preceded by a master repurchase agreement between the investor and the financial institution or dealer. The master agreement should define the nature of the transaction, identify the relationship between the parties, establish normal practices regarding ownership and custody of the collateral securities during the term of the investment, provide remedies in the case of default by either party and clarify

issues of ownership. The master repurchase agreement protects the investor by eliminating the uncertainty of ownership and hence, allowing investors to liquidate collateral if a bank or dealer defaults during the term of the agreement.

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Maturity: The date on which payment of a financial obligation is due. The final stated maturity is the date on which the issuer must retire a bond and pay the face value to the bondholder. See "Weighted Average maturity."

Money market: The market in which short-term debt instruments (bills, commercial paper, bankers' acceptances, etc.) are issued and traded.

Money Market Mutual Fund: Mutual funds that invest solely in money market instruments.

Mutual Fund: An investment company that pools money and can invest in a variety of securities, including fixed-income securities and money market instruments. Mutual funds are regulated by the Investment Company Act of 1940.

National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD): A self-regulatory organization (SRO) of brokers and dealers in the over-the-counter securities business. Its regulatory mandate includes authority over firms that distribute mutual fund shares as well as other securities.


Net Asset Value: The market value of one share of an investment company, such as a mutual fund. This figure is calculated by totaling a fund's assets which includes securities, cash, and any accrued earnings, subtracting this from the fund's liabilities and dividing this total by the number of shares outstanding. This is calculated once a day based on the closing price for each security in the fund's portfolio.

No Load Mutual Fund: A mutual fund which does not levy a sales charge on the purchase of its shares.

Nominal Yield: the stated rate of interest that a bond pays its current owner, based on par value of the security. It is also known as the "coupon," coupon rate," or "interest rate."

Offer: An indicated price at which market participants are willing to sell a security or commodity. Also referred to as the "ask price."

Open Market Operations: Purchases and sales of government and certain other securities in the open market by the New York Federal Reserve Bank as directed by the FOMC in order to influence the volume of money and credit in the economy. Purchases inject reserves into the bank system and stimulate growth of money and credit; sales have the opposite effect. Open market operations are the Federal Reserve's most important and most flexible monetary policy tool.



Repurchase Agreement (RP or REPO): An agreement of one party to purchase securities at a specified price from a second party and a simultaneous agreement by the first party to resell the securities at a specified price to the second party on demand or at a specified date.

Safekceping: Holding of assets (e.g. securities) by a financial institution.

SEC Rule 15C3-1: See uniform net capital rule.

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Secondary Market: A market made for the purchase and sale of outstanding issues following the initial distribution.

Securities & Exchange Commission: Agency created by Congress to protect investors in securities transactions by administering securities legislation.

Serial Bond: A bond issue, usually of a municipality, with various maturity dates scheduled at regular intervals until the entire issue is retired.

Sinking Fund: Money accumulated on a regular basis in a separate custodial account that is used to redeem debt securities or preferred stock issues.

Swap: Trading one asset for another.

Term Bond: Bonds comprising a large part of all of a particular issue which come due in a single maturity. The issuer usually agrees to make periodic payments into a sinking fund for mandatory redemption of term bonds before maturity.

Total Return: The sum of all investment income plus changes in the capital value of the portfolio. For mutual funds, return on an investment is composed of share price appreciation plus any realized dividends or capital gains. This is calculated by taking the following components during a certain time period. (Price Appreciation)+(Dividends paid)+(Capital gains)=Total Return

Treasury Bills: A non-interest bearing discount security issued by the U.S. Treasury to finance the national debt. Most bills are issued to mature in three months, six months or one year in minimum denominations of \$10,000.00. The yields on bills are monitored closely in the money markets for signs of interest rate trends.

Treasury Bond: Long-term U.S. Treasury securities having initial maturities of more than ten years.

Treasury Notes: Intermediate term coupon bearing U.S. Treasury securities having initial maturities from one to ten years. Currently, the longest outstanding maturity for such securities is 30 years.

Uniform Net Capital Rule: Securities and Exchange Commission requirement that thember firms as well as nonmember broker-dealers in securities maintain a maximum ration of indebtedness to liquid capital of 15 to 1: also called net capital rule and net capital ratio. Indebtedness covers all money owed to a firm, including margin loans and commitments to purchase securities. This is one reason new public issues are spread among members of underwriting syndicates. Liquid capital includes cash and assets easily converted into cash.

Volatility: A degree of fluctuation in the price and valuation of securities.

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Volatility Risk Rating: A rating system to clearly indicate the level of volatility and other non-credit risks associated with securities and certain bond funds. The ratings for bond funds range from those that have extremely low sensitivity to changing market conditions and offer the greatest stability of the return ("aaa" by S&P; "V-1" by Fitch) to those that are highly sensitive with currently identifiable market volatility risk ("ccc" by S&P, "V-10" by Fitch).


Weighted Average Maturity (WAM): The average maturity of all the securities that comprise a portfolio. According to SEC rule 2A-7, the WAM for SEC registered money market mutual funds may not exceed 90 days and no one security may have a maturity that exceeds 397 days.

When Issued (WI): A conditional transaction in which an authorized new security has not been issued. All "when issued" transactions are settled when the actual security is issued.

Yield: The rate of annual income return on an investment, expressed as a percentage. (a) Income Yield is obtained by dividing the current dollar income by the current market price of the security. (b) Net Yield or Yield to Maturity is the current income yield minus any premium above par or plus any discount from par n purchase price, with the adjustment spread over the period from the date of purchase to the date of maturity of the bond.

Yield-to-call (YTC): The rate of return an investor earns from a bond assuming the bond is redeemed (called) prior to its nominal maturity date. Yield Curve-A graphic representation that depicts the relationship at a given point in time between yields and maturity for bonds that are identical in every way except maturity. A normal yield curve may be alternatively referred to a positive yield curve.

Yield-to-maturity: The rate of return yielded by a debt security held to maturity when both interest payments and the investor's potential capital gain or loss are included in the calculation of return.
